CLOSURE OF THE HORSPATH OUTREACH POST OFFICE

As many of you will know, the Horspath Outreach Post Office (PO) closed on 28th March. Owing to a fall in which she broke her shoulder, Christine Donnelly, at Great Milton PO, has been forced to retire. The Area Change Manager at Post Office Ltd (POL), has decided not to look into keeping the Great Milton PO open nor the Horspath Outreach PO. Well, I'm not going to accept this.

I loved my job at the Outreach PO based in the Horspath Hub on Friday mornings at the same time as the Coffee Mornings. It opened in late October 2014 with good footfall from the start. I've been told that, as Outreaches go, mine was very successful. Despite being busy, there was usually time to have a chat and a bit of banter with my customers. That made my job so enjoyable.

Some of the trustees of the Hub and I continue to campaign to have the Outreach reinstated. I am most grateful for their help and support in getting an article published in the Oxford Mail. Two of them contributed to the article. The trustees' support is ongoing. There are petitions dotted around the village plus an online version and I'd like to thank everyone who has signed so far. Your support is invaluable.

I rang the Postmaster at Wheatley, who is very keen to manage Horspath Outreach PO. At the time of going to print, the Area Change Manager has not been moved. I have written to Nigel Railton, Chairman of Post Office Ltd, 100 Wood Street, London, EC2V 7ER, explaining the situation and enclosing my foot fall figures for the last three years.

I've done the job of the Post Office Ltd. by finding a Sub Post Office willing to take on our Outreach PO. Mr Patel at Wheatley Post Office is very community-minded and, although he would benefit from the closure of Horspath Outreach, he wants to help the villagers of Horspath, for which we are very grateful.

The Area Change Manager said there were at least three Sub Post Offices within three miles of Horspath. They were all there when I opened!

The Queen's Head

The pub has been called "The Queen's Head" since the 18th Century and the list of known landlords dates back to 1822 with the Kimber family, who managed it for 90 years! It was owned by the brewers, Halls of Oxford and if you look closely by the front door, the plaque is still there! There was once a thatched roof but it

burnt down in 1933 and it was rebuilt with a tile roof. I can imagine that the pub played an important part in the life of the villagers in Horspath back then and indeed nothing has changed there!

I finally managed to track down the landlord, Jason Taylor, for a twenty-minute chat about the pub. He's a very busy and popular man and I've rarely come across anyone who works so hard. He was proud to tell me that he first became bar manager for eight years in 1992, when the pub became a free house, and the landlord in 2017. It's what I would call a proper traditional village pub! It caters for everyone in the village — bingo on Sunday, darts on Wednesday, Aunt Sally in the summer, quizzes, live music, cheap beer, Live Sports — it's all there. I just wondered how Jason manages to fit it all in. "I love my job. I love being at the heart of the community in Horspath and being able to welcome people to the pub for their social life" he said. He also has five rooms to offer bed and breakfast — all regularly full with guests from far and wide.

Jason works with Phanpat to offer Thai and English menus for lunch and dinner. You have to book early to get a place for the lovely Sunday roast dinner. The Horspath Senior Residents' Association regularly pack out the restaurant and many villagers benefit from the Stone Pit Charity vouchers to eat here. And just in case Jason and Phanpat thought that they had time to spare, they cater for wakes, christenings and birthday parties. The marquee is available in the summer for functions too and you can even bring your own food to barbeque!

Jason rushed off to meet a delivery man and I chatted to a local resident who was settling down to his pint of Doombar getting ready to watch the Cheltenham races. "It's grand in here", he says. "I love it!"

Safe, fun, traffic-free cycling for adults of all abilities

Have you ever been passing by the Horspath athletics track and seen dozens of different bicycles lined up? If you go by on a Tuesday or Friday morning, you'll see hybrid bikes, adult three-wheeled 'trikes', sturdy four-wheelers, tandems, side-by-sides, recliners, hand-pedalled bikes, e-bikes and lots more.

This is CyclAbility (<u>ww.cyclability.org</u>), a non-profit organisation that provides cycling opportunities for all adults (age 16+), no matter their physical abilities.

I recently started volunteering for CyclAbility and love it – it's such a positive and inspiring experience. I've even met some Horspath residents who are regular CyclAbility riders.

Some people come with a carer or supporter; others come on their own or with a friend. Some may be recovering from an accident or learning how to cycle with an impairment and want to try out different bicycles, including e-bikes. And some people come because they haven't cycled for a long time and want to practise in a safe, supportive, traffic-free space.

If you or someone you know fancies a pedal round the track, it would be great to see you there. Book a slot at www.cyclability.org, which costs £5, then come along and choose from the huge fleet of bikes. Ride one or try several, on your

own or with a friend. If you have questions or need any help, you can ask the trained instructors and volunteers. Afterwards, have a cup of tea and a biscuit and chat to other participants.



St Giles' TikTock

The clock mechanism which now stands by the ringing chamber screen is a version of an early pendulum clock, which first appeared in the early 18 th .c, and was modified by Robert Hooke from the previous pendulum mechanism invented by Christian Huygens before 1700. The example in St. Giles has long been known as a "blacksmith's clock", and was originally placed on a wooden frame in the intermediate room in the tower immediately below the bells, beneath which was the metre-long pendulum. The pendulum and mechanism were driven by two large weights suspended beneath, which meant that someone had to routinely ascend the steps and raise the weights - a tiring business! The clock had no face, nor was there ever one on the tower, and the time was simply marked by a hammer which was arranged to strike the tenor bell immediately above. This practice probably ceased in the 1960s.... Cecil Surman, churchwarden and parish clerk for many years, was the last person to take on the task of hauling up the weights; after that St Giles had no clock-chime at all to be heard, and eventually the entire clock was lowered to its present position in 1986. Then it was cleaned and restored for display, though for a short time it was made to work without striking the bell, and simply gave a very satisfying "tick-tock" every second. The clock could well have been made locally by the blacksmith - probably Robert Hunt – who had a forge situated in what is now Ford's close, which closed when his son, also Robert, died in 1898. It follows the mechanical style of the time, and there is a rather similar, but larger, version of it in Salisbury Cathedral – now also on display.... but it could equally have been made elsewhere, and probably dates from around 1740. So the clock had over two hundred years of use.



Dear Horspath residents,

Will you join me and take part in 'No Mow May' this year?

Our insects are fighting a battle to survive against pesticide use and loss of habitat. The 2021 Bugs Matter Survey indicated a ~60% reduction in the UK's flying insect population since 2004. Our gardens can offer a safe haven for them, but only if we don't pave over them or manicure



them into sterile environments bereft of all wildlife. When we lose insects, we destroy our fragile ecosystems leading to a decline in dependent species, like many of our garden birds.

'No Mow May' is an annual campaign by Plantlife, encouraging people to allow some longer grass and wildflowers to grow as a food source for our bees and butterflies. So please join me in sitting back for a month and watch nature bloom.

In just 4 weeks your lawn really won't become unmanageable. You also won't get a lawn full of beautiful wild flowers from a single month of no mowing - it is a cumulative effect year on year. What you will start to see is more daisies and clover; later buttercups, yarrow and dandelions will join the array. Gradually violets and primroses are likely to appear and spread.

You also don't need to leave the whole of your lawn unmown. Both long and shorter (not very short) grass are important for wildlife. You could mow paths through longer grass, or just have one out of the way patch that you let grow longer.

When we first moved to Horspath, I started to dig out the dandelions in the lawn. I quickly realised I would be fighting a losing battle. Now I wonder what I was thinking, they are beautiful; and entirely edible if you do have a few too many. Most importantly they are an early source of pollen and nectar for sleepy bees waking from their winter slumber. Now I actively encourage the spread of violets, clover, buttercups and more as you can see the garden looks a little different after nearly 10 years of 'wilding'.

If you decide you prefer the sound of bird song to your lawn mower, then take another four weeks off and continue with 'Let It Bloom June'.

With over 20 million gardens in the UK, imagine the difference we can make. As I write this I'm watching a bright yellow brimstone butterfly fluttering against an azure blue sky.

So sit back and watch butterflies with your feet up for the month of May (and beyond) U Jo Milton

Horspath Cricket Club gear up for their New Campaign



It's all systems go as Horspath Cricket Club prepare to start a new season. Having been crowned Cherwell League champions last year, the club begin their build-up ahead of a return to the Home Counties Premier Cricket League with a friendly against Banbury at the Recreation Ground on Saturday, April 12. Meanwhile, Horspath women are gearing up for the new season on the back of a successful campaign in the Oxfordshire Indoor League. The club marked International Women's Day by completing their fixtures to finish third in the group with five wins from eight games. Now the action switches outdoors with

Horspath hosting Abingdon Vale and Faringdon & District in the opening round of fixtures in the Home Counties Women's Cricket League Super 8 Development Group 1 on Sunday, May 4. The side will again be captained by Munaza Dogar. The youth section will also be busy with Horspath set to field teams from under 9 to under 17 with the opening games on Monday, April 28, and for the first time an Under 11 Girls' team. In addition, there will once more be the popular All Stars (5-8yo) and Dynamos (8-11yo) programmes, starting on Friday, May 9.

Look out for ...

If you're walking on Shotover this spring, look out for: **Oak tree.** In April and May, we see "budburst" as the leaves of oak trees emerge, which can support up to 2,300 species of wildlife, including birds, bats, butterflies and winter moths.



Where to look: throughout
Brasenose Wood and Shotover
Hill. Many oaks are self-seeded,
but in earlier times they were often
deliberately planted in prominent
positions as landmarks.

What to look for: oak trees are tall, with wide trunks, lobed leaves and rough, grooved bark. Look for green caterpillars, hanging down from the canopy on silk threads. These are a new generation of winter moth - they feast on the oak's new leaves, then drop down to lower levels of the wood in search of their next meal. The caterpillars are an essential source of nutrition for great tits and blue tits as they nest and raise their young.

Did you know? in the C17th, timber from the oak trees of Shotover were used to build ships for the Royal Navy

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Chocolate Recipes

Chocolate Cookies

From the Good Housekeeping basic cookbook.

Given to us at our wedding in 1970.

I usually omit the walnuts

75g (3oz) butter 175g(6oz) self raising flour
75g(3oz) granulated sugar a pinch salt
75g(3oz) brown sugar 50g(2oz) walnuts chopped
A few drops of vanilla essence 50-100g(2-4 oz) chocolate chips
1 egg

Grease 2 baking sheets. Cream the butter with the sugars and vanilla essence. Then beat in the egg. Fold in the sifted flour and salt with the nuts and chocolate chips. Drop spoonfuls of the mixture onto the baking sheets and bake for 10-12 minutes at 180C (350F) Cool on a wire rack

Chocolate Crunch

225g stork margarine
I Tbsp cocoa
85 g coconut
85g crushed cornflakes
140g sugar
140g self raising flour

Melt the margarine and stir in all the ingredients. Press into a Swiss roll tin and cook for 20 minutes at 180′C. Cool and cover with chocolate.

Morland House Surgery (MHS)

Changes taking place at the Morland House Surgery. Below is a short summary. A report in November 2024 by the Practice Manager

Evolving Clinical Roles

In 2019 the NHS formed **Primary Care Networks (PCNs)**. MHS is now part of the Thame PCN, along with the Rycote Practice and the Chiltern & The Brook Surgeries. The PCN has been expanding the clinical team, bringing new benefits and better care to patients relieving pressure on GPs. MHS now has 2 clinical pharmacists, 1 pharmacy technician, 2 social prescribers, 2 care coordinators and 1 paramedic. The role of each team is as follows:

- **1. Pharmacy Team:** medication queries and advice, carry out annual medication reviews, provide medication advice to GPs, carry out mandated audits and quality improvement projects.
- 2. Social Prescribing Team: helps identify practical, social and emotional needs affecting health and wellbeing. Links people to existing community resources, particularly people with one or more long term conditions, those who need support with low level mental health issues, are lonely or isolated and have complex social needs which affect their wellbeing.
- **3.** Paramedic sees various conditions and issues e.g. rashes, chest infections, lumps, migraines, general pains, high heart rate and wound issues. Also carries out home visits ahead of GP visit to take vitals and history.

Embracing Technology

MHS has been introducing new technology channels by which patients can contact the surgery: **New telephone digital system** offering more lines, no engaged tone!!, call queueing, call back service, patient recognition & connection with clinical system and call recording.

eConsult – carry out an online consultation via the internet for free at anytime from anywhere for a health issue. Visit www.morland-house.co.uk, click 'Contact us online', complete the questionnaire and submit. Your eConsult will be viewed by a clinician and you will be contacted before the end of the following working day with the next steps.

Contact MHS via NHS App The NHS App is a free, secure tool that allows patients (aged 13+) to access NHS services on their smartphone or tablet. You can book appointments, order repeat prescriptions, choose which pharmacy to collect from, view your GP patient health record, view messages from MHS, register your organ donation decision, choose how NHS uses your data etc.

Use NHS 111 online to get instant advice or medical help near you.

Other Technology Advancements: text messaging and emails, text invitations to book appointments.

Dear Residents of Horspath,



It has been a busy few months in both Parliament and our constituency, and I'd like to share some key updates.

Improving ADHD Services in Oxfordshire

Our campaign to improve ADHD services is progressing. I joined fellow MPs in urging the Health Secretary to take action and discussed this with local NHS leaders. I am hopeful that essential services, especially for young adults transitioning from CAMHS to adult care, will be restored soon.

Local Council Developments

I will step down as a Councillor in May, but in February, I attended council budget meetings:

- Oxfordshire County Council approved a historic £59 million increase for road maintenance.
- South Oxfordshire District Council passed a budget boosting grants for community and voluntary groups.

National Legislation and Water Issues

In January, Parliament debated key legislation on regulating water companies and sewage management. Unfortunately, amendments to strengthen executive accountability were not included. I also backed an amendment for stronger ecological protections in National Landscapes, crucial for Oxfordshire's countryside.

Flooding Crisis Update

Flooding remains a priority. I tabled an Early Day Motion urging the Government to review support criteria, ensuring affected properties receive the help they need.

Post Office Concerns

I am deeply concerned about the uncertainty surrounding our post office and will do all I can to ensure it continues serving Horspath.

Thank you to all of the volunteers who came to help out with the litter picking around the village on Saturday 8th March 2025, your help is much appreciated.

Oxfordshire County Council will be repairing the steps on Church Road, and Councillors have agreed that bollards will be installed either side of the steps.

A site meeting took place in February 2025 to look at the possible location for a new play area. As Horspath was unsuccessful with a grant application to South Oxfordshire District Council CIL fund for a new play area, Horspath Parish Council submitted a grant application to Horspath Stone Pit Charity which was considered at the March meeting. Trustees awarded a grant to provide a new play area for the village. Councillors have agreed that this project can commence as soon as plans have been finalised.

Oxfordshire County Council has confirmed that a new bus shelter can be installed. A meeting will take place with an Engineer from Oxfordshire County Council to inspect the proposed location.

Horspath has purchased a new mower for the village, thanks to a grant from Horspath Stone Pit Charity.

Horspath Parish Council has recently been awarded a grant from Horspath Stone Pit Charity for the refurbishment and extension of the village hall. More information to follow.

Mrs Oakley, Chair of Horspath Parish Council continues to report numerous potholes and blocked drains around the village to Fix-My-Street.

Horspath Stone Pit Charity

Mr Tim Bearder – County Councillor for Horspath has recently circulated a questionnaire regarding Horspath Stone Pit Charity claiming that he is a non-voting Independent Advisor for the Charity. Mr Bearder has not attended a meeting of the Trustees for Horspath Stone Pit Charity since January 2023 and did not have permission from Trustees to circulate the questionnaire.

The following letter has been sent to Mr Bearder:-

"The Trustees of Horspath Stone Pit Charity and the Independent Advisors in connection with the attached flyer that has been delivered by you or on your behalf to some of the Horspath residents. You have signed off the flyer as being the "County Councillor for Wheatley and Horspath" have asked me to contact you on their behalf. You have not attended any meetings of the Parish Council since September 2023. It is normal protocol for those expected to attend such meetings to offer their apology and give a brief explanation as to why they are unable to attend. You have never followed this protocol.

If a member of the County Council is unable to attend, it is common practice for a report to be submitted to the Clerk of any actions or decisions that have been made by the council that affect the residents of the village they represent and any representations made by the Councillor on their behalf. The Parish Council has not received any such report from you since your last attendance. In your leaflet you state that you sit as a non-voting Independent Advisor which is incorrect as you did indeed have the right to vote on any proposals. You also claim that only members of the Parish Council are Trustees of the Charity but this is not the case. There have been up to five Independent Advisors who are entitled to vote on proposals. In fact no grants can be made without the consent of a majority of these Advisors. You have not attended any meetings of the Trustees of the charity since January 2023, and in fact you have made no contact since then. As a consequence of your non-attendance or indeed any contact, the Trustees voted at the last meeting to remove you as an Independent Advisor. You have distributed the leaflet without any consultation with your fellow Independent Advisors or the Trustees and indeed are carrying out a survey without giving them prior notice. If you had attended any meetings since January 2023 you would also have been aware of various projects under consideration. The final paragraph of the first page of your flyer is grammatically incorrect but you state that you will use the results of your survey to inform your advice to the charity. This seems somewhat curious as you have made no contact since January 2023. It is the intention of the trustees of the charity and the independent advisors to publish a copy of this communication on the Parish's website"

At the March 2025 meeting, Trustees voted in favour of suspending all organisation grants with immediate effect until the refurbishment of the village hall has been completed. After this time, applications will be open again for organisations to apply for a grant.

Trustees have recently reviewed the criteria for awarding grants and the possibility of increasing school uniform grants, and it was agreed that no changes will be made to children's grants at the moment, but will be reviewed again next year.

The next Horspath Stone Pit Charity meeting will be held in June 2025. The closing date for applications will be 1st June 2025.

Trustees would like to remind all residents who are successfully awarded a grant that receipts **must** be provided to the value of the grant within 3 months of receipt.
