Letter from the Vicar

Dear Friends

It's difficult to believe that, by the time you read this, it will be Advent, and many of us will have

begun the countdown towards Christmas. Advent is traditionally a time when Christians pause and reflect, and observe a season of waiting, before we celebrate Jesus' birth on Christmas Day, and throughout the Christmas season. However, it's very difficult to maintain a period of waiting, and not begin our Christmas celebrations early, when – out of necessity – many of our Christmas services and events must take place some weeks before Christmas. School nativities, Carol Services and Christmas parties must, of course, take place before schools break up in December – and it's always a joy to welcome our school into church in the run up to Christmas.

It's difficult to observe Advent as a period of waiting and reflecting, when we're also watching nativity plays, attending Christmas parties, and singing Christmas carols. Then, there's presents to buy and wrap, cards to write, baking, sweet-making, decorating, and all the other practical tasks we do to get ready for Christmas.

I wonder, how can you ensure that *you* have time to pause and reflect, this Advent, and enjoy the season of waiting, amidst all the busyness of preparing for Christmas? Perhaps you could find a different Advent or Christmas carol each day, and spend some time reflecting on the words and their meaning? Perhaps you could read a poem a day? Or a Bible passage? Perhaps you could buy an Advent candle and spend some time each day, as the candle burns, reading a chapter of Luke's Gospel? (There are 24 chapters in Luke's Gospel so, if you begin on 1st December, you'll finish on Christmas Eve, and can then come along to Midnight Mass, which begins at 11:30pm, to begin your Christmas celebrations).

If you like the idea of reading a poem each day in Advent, I can recommend Malcolm Guite's *Waiting on the Word*, and Janet Morley's *Haphazard by Starlight*. If you prefer a novel, there's *The Advent Calendar*, by our own bishop, Steven Croft; *The Christmas Mystery* and *Through a Glass*, *Darkly* by Jostein Gaarder; or – for younger readers

and the young at heart – perhaps C S Lewis's *The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe*. If you prefer a more traditional Advent book, with daily Bible readings, reflections, a carol or hymn, and a prayer, then someone recently recommended *Repeat the Sounding Joy,* by Christopher Ash.

I'd like to end with a prayer-poem for Advent, written by Ruth Burgess:

Bright star-maker God,
travel with us
through Advent
shine into our dark corners
lead us into ways of justice
warm us with joy and wonder
bring us
to a new birth.

I pray that you may find time, this Advent, to pause, reflect and pray, as we prepare to celebrate Christ's coming at Christmas; and I hope to see you at some of our Advent and Christmas events and services in St Giles'.

May God bless you in this time of waiting, and give you his peace.

With my very best wishes for Advent, Christmas and the New Year.

Horspath Parish Council



Horspath Parish Council welcomes Eddie Parker, the newest councillor on HPC. Over the last few months several new residents have been co-opted on to HPC all brimming with enthusiasm and new ideas. Plans to carry out improvements to the village are in the

pipeline but everything takes time. Sorting out quotations, contractors etc. but some improvements have been made. The burial ground gates now open and 3 quotations for repairs to the coping stones on the wall have been received. New goal posts are to be fixed in the Mutton Field. Engaging with Oxfordshire County Council in relation to traffic calming measures is proving difficult. There seems to be a lack of impetus in helping the Parish Council achieve its aim but we are not disgruntled and will plod on. The majority of residents voted in favour of introducing the 20mph speed limit through most parts of the village but this could take up to two and a half years before O.C.C. Implements that decision.

I wish to remind all residents that parking on the pavements is restricting access for some of our infirm residents and people with pushchairs. Although it may not be a traffic offence it is causing considerable distress to many who might be forced into the road, so please be courteous to our fellow residents.

A major change to HPC protocol is that there are no longer sub committees. All councillors are equal members and decisions are carried out by the whole of the council. This will ensure no financial transactions are made unless ratified by full council and full transparency is paramount in all dealings.

The date of the next Horspath Parish Council meeting will be December 6th in the village hall at 20.00.

Horspath Stone Pit Charity

All Parish Councillors are Trustees of Horspath Stone Pit Charity. We are very fortunate to welcome two independent advisors, Bob Hamlet and Hilary Franklin to join Brian Lowe, Elizabeth Gillespie and Tim Bearder. At the September meeting it was agreed by almost all Trustees that the Infrastructure Fund be scrapped which had been introduced in January. The Trustees felt there was considerable opposition from Horspath residents to this grant which meant village organisations could potentially receive up to £75,000.00 from the Stone Pit Charity. One of the main differences in how the Trustees deal with applications is that every application will be assessed in an open Stone Pit meeting. It has been mentioned numerous times that residents do not know where the money is being allocated. Anyone applying for a grant will also sign acceptance that the reason for the grant will be displayed on the noticeboard and on the website. No personal details will be shown. I would also like to point out for residents information that in accordance with Charitable Law NO Trustee is permitted to personally gain financially from this charity.

She was very much part of our community and was a member of the Parish Council. The piano in St Giles was given by her.

In her later years she went to live in St Luke's care home and was happy there. The home really liked her too.

Hopefully her ashes will be buried in our churchyard so she can continue to be part of our community

Obituaries

George Bown, R.I.P.



George Bown, who has died as the result of a tragic accident, was a familiar figure in Horspath. He and his wife, Joy, came to live in Collcutt Close in 1983. George, an engineer and mechanic by trade, worked for twenty-two years at Pressed Steel; later, he worked as a mechanic for British Telecom and subsequently at Oxford University where he used his skills 'fixing anything that was broken' (says his daughter, Cara). Always full of energy and a desire to work, 'retirement' was not really

the appropriate word to describe George's life. His long lasting interest in repairing and breathing new life into vintage cars and motorbikes developed into something of a passion. He loved acquiring beat-up old cars, vans, push-bikes (including at least one penny farthing bicycle), trucks – anything with wheels, basically – pulling on his overalls, getting out his tools from his immaculately kept garage and making each one like new again. Engines purred, wheels turned effortlessly, gears slotted into place, bodywork gleamed once George had worked on them. He never lost his restless energy – always up before 7.00 am to go swimming, work in his garden or get back to his beloved engines. His other passion was engaging in political or philosophical discussion, chatting with anyone who came by and putting the world to rights. George was a real friend, a tirelessly helpful neighbour and he is sadly missed by all. He leaves his wife, Joy, and daughters Cara and Julia.

NESTA RUTH LONG, R.I.P. It is with great sadness that I have to announce the death of Nesta Long, a much loved and well-known Horspath resident, the daughter of Winifred & Percy Long, who for most of her life lived in Cuddesdon Road, in the house built by her grandfather. She went to Horspath School, and later joined the famous Oxford department store of Elliston & Cavell (continuing with Debenhams), in ladies fashion, right through until her retirement. Throughout most of her life she was an active member of the Women's Institute and Horspath Methodist Church, later worshiping at St. Giles from 2005, where she was again very involved in the church community as a long-term flower arranger and a valued bellringer. She traveled widely, with her 35mm camera, and produced many excellent slides wherever she went, both of her travels and of her village, Horspath. Nesta had a caring personality combined with a famously dry wit, which she carried through her last illness.
