At the recent 2024 Oxford CAMRA Beer & Cider Festival which also hosted the SIBA Midland Region Independent Beer Awards, Oxford Brewery, based in Horspath were awarded a competition **Gold Medal** for their cask Shotover Trinity, Pale Ale 4.2% and a Bronze Medal for their keg Oxford Nitro Porter 5.0%. To put this in context, there was in excess of 140 cask ales, some ciders and a selection of keg beers blind tasted by the large panel of judges.

The Bookseller of Thame

How many independent bookshops do you know? Sadly, there are very few in Oxfordshire but how lucky are we to have one, "The Book House" in Thame, on our doorstep. It is well worth a visit! A good chance to buy many of those Christmas presents and chat to the charismatic bookseller, Luise!

The shop started its long life in 1972, opening as a children's book shop – The Red House. It looks very small from the outside but it goes a long way back, a bit like a Tardis, and is full of a wondrous collection of books. Luise Pattinson, who lives in Horspath, has worked at the shop for forty years, in fact ever since she left school and just loves the cut and thrust of the business. She came from a family of "book-addicts" and remembers going to The Red House as a child, running up the High Street to reach the Fat Puffin that once stood outside. Sadly, the Puffin is now in need of repair, not surprisingly since he's sat outside since 1972!

Luise is very enthusiastic about everything to do with books. She says, "Books and bookshops are such a precious thing in these times. It's a chance to browse, meet people and have a chat. I have one lady who comes into the shop every day to do just that. She buys a card saying that it means she writes to someone that she knows but doesn't see. I just love that!" Luise's love of books is very apparent. She enthuses, "I think that books are like little capsules of wonder waiting to inspire you. Each contains information that you didn't know existed. How exciting is that!"

Did you know that there are 436 books published every day in the UK? Being an Independent book shop means that Luise can choose which books she wants to sell when the representatives from the publishing houses come to visit each month. "I won't sell books written by criminals" she says, "Why should they profit from book sales? Certainly not in my shop!" However, she did admit that she has a few books about local ex-politicians though!

Luise thinks that all books should be beautiful – it's part of their inherent worth. Being a specialist in children's books, she is passionate about story time and reading to children. What are your favourite children's stories, Luise? As a child, "Where the Wild Things Are", Aesop's fables, Richard Scarry, Wind in the Willows......oh too many to name. And Mensun Bound's books give me goosebumps!

You must go to Thame to sample Luise's box of delights!

The children and staff of Horspath School are busy learning, and preparing for Christmas as I write this and the excitement is building. Schools are such busy but joyful places at this time of year and I would challenge anyone not to get caught up in some of their joy.

As a church school, we teach our children the reasons Christmas is celebrated in an inclusive way so that all children understand the reason why they will come across lights and gifts everywhere they look. It is also a good opportunity to consider other festivals which include light and colour and reflect on how these things can lift our spirits.

This term, it has been a delight to see the children employing strategies to help themselves and to persevere when their learning or friendships become tricky. In the first term, we worked on kindness and it has been wonderful to award values certificates to children for their kindness to others this term.

In early November, we took a team of year 5 and 6 boys and girls to a netball tournament at Wheatley Park School. The team trained a few times before half term and were nervous when they went out for the first match. Later in the evening, they were feeling increasingly confident and were passing the ball well and scoring. I was incredibly proud of the way they conducted themselves, worked as a team and demonstrated teamwork and sportsmanship towards other schools. Ending the tournament in joint third place was a wonderful end to the evening. We would all like to thank the parents who helped out, especially our netball expert!

We attended the Armistice Day service at the memorial, with some of our school council members laying 2 wreaths from the children and parents and staff of the school. Some of our oldest children read the poem 'In Flanders Fields' as part of the service and our school council enjoyed mingling at the hub afterwards.

We have a number of children attending our school, who are regular visitors to the Oxford Children's Hospital and we received a request from them asking if we would mark World Diabetes Day with our children who

have Type 1 Diabetes and to raise some money for the hospital. Some of our children and parents gave a presentation and everyone was invited to wear something blue for the day to help us raise awareness of hidden conditions. Later in the year, there are families who will present information about other conditions within our school community as this is an excellent way to raise awareness and understanding of different conditions.

Children in Need was another event celebrated in school this term where we did our bit to raise money for this national charity. We always ensure that our children know why they are supporting these charities and we are working on courageous advocacy, which places the emphasis on what we can do to make a difference rather than simply fundraising.

I hope everyone in our community has a wonderful Christmas and wish you all the best for a happy new year.



A Christmas Letter from the Vicar

Dear Friends, I'm writing this in mid-November – but very conscious that it will be December, and Advent, by the time you read this. I was commenting to friends this evening that I dislike November, when the days are so short and it gets dark so early, but I always feel better once Advent/December starts, with the excitement of carol services, Christmas lunches, parties, concerts, and the countdown to Christmas. I'm looking forward to Advent and Christmas this year. It's always an exciting time of year. And I hope to see you at some of our services and events during December and January. Of course, this year, most of us will be mindful of the situation in Gaza, the West Bank, Lebanon and the Middle East, and our Christmas joy will be tempered by grief and sadness over the destruction of lives, homes, hospitals, schools, and businesses in the land where our Saviour was born, and where he exercised much of his healing and teaching ministry. In August, I attended the Greenbelt festival, near Kettering. At the main Communion Service on the Sunday morning, there was a live link to the Tent of Nations - a Christian-run farm, and peace-making project, in the hills near Bethlehem; and members of the community there joined us forworship. At the beginning of the service, we were all invited to pick up our bags, chairs and other belongings and relocate to another area of the large field in front of the main stage - a symbolic action reminding us of all the Palestinian people forced, by conflict, to flee their homes and become

refugees. Locally baked loaves of bread, in paper bags, were then thrown into the congregation – much as food is distributed from lorries and vans in many conflict zones – and we were encouraged to throw the loaves of bread to those behind us in the crowd, trusting that the communion bread we passed on to other groups would be broken and shared, so that none went without. We were encouraged to share our bread like those who are still searching for a safe home.

This December, as we celebrate Advent and Christmas, let's not forget the agony and pain of so many people in the land where Jesus was born.

Dear Residents of Horspath,

I'm excited to introduce myself as your newly elected Member of Parliament. The past few months have been a whirlwind, and I'm grateful for the opportunity to represent and serve our community. It's been a busy time getting to grips with the role and meeting so many of you, and I'm looking forward to continuing our work together to make a positive impact



here in Horspath. Reflecting on my first three months, I'm proud of the progress made, though I recognise this is just the beginning. I now have a full team in place, including five caseworkers based in our new Chalgrove office, working hard to handle the backlog of emails and support residents with individual cases. I've also been meeting with local stakeholders, particularly in the NHS, to build strong relationships and push for better outcomes for residents. In other good news, Tracey Isaac was presented with a Metro Bank Champion of Girls Cricket Award.


The club holds its AGM in the clubroom on Sunday, January 19 (11am). All members welcome.

The Horspath Scarecrow Trail 2024

Now in its fifth year, the Horspath Scarecrow Trail has become a beloved October half-term tradition. Originally created to bring people together safely after lockdown, the trail now draws crowds from across Oxfordshire



and beyond. This year's theme, "Around the World in 9 Days," attracted around 1,500 visitors to our village to explore 39 unique scarecrows. Scarecrows ranged from a tea-sipping Paddington Bear with the Queen to a leprechaun and a grand replica of Rio's Christ the Redeemer. For the first time, "mini" scarecrows, waving flags and sharing world facts, were included in gardens of our older supporters. Armed with maps, families traversed the village, admiring the creativity and answering fun questions at each stop. Families return year after year, with some bringing friends and relatives from as far as France, Germany, and across the UK. While

we saw a fantastic turnout, we did miss seeing many local residents buying maps in the Hub. These maps, kindly printed and donated by Minuteman Press Oxford, are essential to our fundraising efforts, supporting both the Hub and St. Giles' Church in their community work. Next year, we hope more residents will join us and contribute to making this event even more impactful. As always, picking the best scarecrow was challenging due to the high standards set by creators. This year's "People's Choice" award went to Paddington Bear, with the Statue of Liberty and a Texas cowboy close behind. The organizers' favourite also went to the Texas cowboy for its incredible craftsmanship—including a lasso held aloft for the entire nine days! Thank you to everyone who explored the trail and contributed to this wonderful event. Through your support, we raised essential funds for the Hub and St. Giles' Church, enabling them to continue their work in our village. Here's to another successful year, and we look forward to seeing even more of you in 2025!



Carbon Capture for Christmas

What we at Shotover Wildlife want for Christmas is a way to make our conservation work even greener. And this will be granted, thanks in part to an ingenious use of timber from a much-loved tree. Shotover Wildlife's work is about biodiversity. We restore the hill's rarest habitats and protect the species that depend on them, many of which are endangered. Sometimes it is necessary to clear trees that have encroached on these special habitats


creating timber, which in addition to the trees that fall naturally, must be managed in a way that's best for the environment. This raises a challenge in terms of climate change. There is carbon locked up in the trunks and branches of trees, and the more slowly this carbon is returned to the atmosphere, the better. If the wood can be re-used, it can store carbon for decades. If left to rot on the ground, the carbon is lost in a few years. If it is burnt, it takes only a few hours. The best types of trees to store carbon are those that form hard, dense wood, such as oak, beech and hawthorn. They are long-lived, and their timber rots down very

slowly, locking up carbon for a long time. One famous example was the huge 'Shotover Oak', thought to have been a sapling during the reign of Queen Elizabeth 1st. It stored up carbon for centuries, then on 13 th July 2014, it fell due to natural causes. The trees that SW volunteers clear make a much smaller contribution to the country park's carbon budget. Nevertheless, we routinely reduce the rate at which carbon dioxide is released into the atmosphere, by piling up logs rather than leaving them to rot on the ground. A major improvement in carbon storage can be achieved by constructing wooden frames, which raise the logs off the ground. This allows better air circulation, reducing rot to an absolute minimum. Our most ingenious idea is to use Shotover timber to make the frames, and this is how the fallen Shotover Oak joins the party. We still mourn the loss of this iconic tree, and others like it, but their wood now has an important new role. It will be used to build frames, which slow down the release of carbon from the by-products of our conservation work. Now that sounds like a great present, for Shotover Wildlife and the planet.

Horspath Parish Council

Councillors were expecting to receive an update in October regarding the grant application that was submitted to South Oxfordshire District Council's Community Infrastructure Levy Grant Scheme for a new play area, but this has now been put back until November. The new play area will replace the existing play area by the village hall. More information to follow

A local Tree Surgeon has now felled the damaged Horse Chestnut tree and the Cherry tree on the Village Green.

Following requests from residents, Mrs Oakley will obtain quotations for a new bus shelter on the Green.

Councillors have recently voted unanimously in favour of extending and refurbishing the existing village hall rather than build a new village hall. This decision was taken due to the huge increase in the cost of materials. A meeting has taken place with an architect and planning consultant and a full planning application has been submitted to South Oxfordshire District Council.

Sustrans held community events in the village in May 2024 and October 2024. The proposal is for a new cycle route through the village and also a parallel crossing opposite the Hub. Sustrans have approached Horspath Parish Council to request a small piece of the village green be given to allow for the crossing. Councillors do not support a crossing at this location. Councillors stated that subject receiving plans, an agreed location, and depending on how much land is required, they would agree in principle. Councillors and residents in the village have expressed their views to Sustrans against the proposed cycle route, but it is likely that it has already been decided.

Oxfordshire County Council held a consultation on the proposed 20mph & 40mph speed limits in the village. The proposal is to introduce a 20mph speed limit in Horspath to replace the majority of 30mph speed limits. 30mph speed limits will be retained on sections of Cuddesdon Road, Littleworth and Windmill Lane. A 40mph speed limit will be introduced on Horspath Road/Oxford Road in place of the existing 60mph speed limit. The consultation closed on Friday 11th October 2024. More information to follow.

The Clerk has registered Horspath village for a Christmas tree collection point that will take place in January. Date to be confirmed.
