We are 12 people who meet at the Hub every Tuesday from 2:00 to 3:00. Some people come a little early to have a bit of a chat before the class. "A fun (and full on) way to keep our muscles working thanks to Keilee, our lively teacher."

We do "great exercises with lovely people."
This class gives us "exercise that keeps us feeling uplifted and motivated."

Rough Roads, Wild Rides: A Cyclist's Journey East



Wendy, my wife at the time and I were devoted cyclists, the kind who didn't just talk about it but pedalled the length of Britain, from John O' Groats to Land's End, on custom-built bikes. We were also seasoned travellers with a particular fondness for heading "Out East." In the late 1970s, the mountain bike made its debut in the USA and soon found its way to the UK. We were quick to see its potential, not just for weekend trails, but for serious travel. Chas Roberts of Croydon built us a pair of rugged off-road bikes, perfectly suited to the rough roads of Asia. With them, we spent six months exploring India, Nepal, and Pakistan, covering far more ground than we ever could on foot or by bus. By 1989, our passion had found its way into print. In Volume 2, Issue 1 of 'Mountain Biking UK', Wendy and I joined the

magazine's newly formed bike test team. I served as photo-journalist, capturing both the words and images. Later that year, in Issue 9, I expanded my role: not only did I write and photograph the bike test, but I also travelled to the Haute Pyrenees in France with a fellow contributor to cover the emerging world of overseas cycling holidays. He wrote the article on Borderline Holidays; I took the pictures. That same issue featured another piece, Nepal for All, spotlighting Himalayan Mountain Bikes in Kathmandu. I travelled solo for that one, so the story and photos were entirely mine. Over the next few years, I contributed several more overseas articles, often combining travel with bike testing. These included two more trips to France, a journey through Norway, and a visit to the Greek island of Lefkas. For that last one, I wrote the piece but someone else handled the photography. One standout article, Conquest of the Grande Randonnee 5, was penned by John Phillips. Its introduction reads: "As it turned out, I didn't go it alone. After a chance meeting in a Canterbury pub, I was joined by my old friend, M.B.U.K. test editor Nigel." That kind of serendipity was typical of the era. Beyond travel, I also wrote and photographed reviews regarding lights, bike computers, helmets, shoes and anything that helped riders go further, safer, and smarter. As some of you may know, all of this came to an abrupt end in 1992, following a near-death experience just across the border from California into Mexico. Life changed dramatically after that, but the road we travelled, and the stories we told, remain. **Nigel Jackson**

Letter from the Vicar

Dear Friends

Advent, which begins on Sunday 30th November, is a season for watching and waiting, as we wait and prepare to celebrate the birth of Jesus at Christmas. At Carol Services, and Midnight Mass, we often hear the beautiful prologue, or beginning, of John's Gospel:

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. ² He was in the beginning with God. ³ All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being ⁴ in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. ⁵ The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. ⁶ There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. ⁷ He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. ⁸ He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. ⁹
The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world..."

Those words send shivers down my spine, especially when read by candlelight, in a darkened church. In Advent, we wait for the coming of the Lord, who brings both life and light. We watch, expectantly – like a sentry, on a rooftop, watching for the first glimmer of light from a distant beacon. This idea of the light of Christ appearing gradually, like the light from beacons spreading from one hill-top to another, is picked up in Malcolm Guite's sonnet *O Oriens:*

E vidi lume in forme de riviera Paradiso XXX; 61

First light and then first lines along the east To touch and brush a sheen of light on water As though behind the sky itself they traced

The shift and shimmer of another river Flowing unbidden from its hidden source; The Day-Spring, the eternal Prima Vera.

Blake saw it too. Dante and Beatrice Are bathing in it now, away upstream... So every trace of light begins a grace

In me, a beckoning. The smallest gleam Is somehow a beginning and a calling; "Sleeper awake, the darkness was a dream Wishing you a peaceful and blessed Advent, a joyful Christmas, and a happy and healthy New Year.

I hope and pray that, this Advent, you might see

signs of light in the darkness, to remind you of

the coming of Emmanuel - God with us - the

God who left his heavenly throne to pitch his

tent among us, so that we might know God, and

might know his great love for us and for the

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Saint John Henry Newman

As you may well have heard in the media recently, on the 1st November 2025, Saint John Henry Newman became a Doctor of the Roman Catholic Church. This recognised this English cardinal and theologian as one of the most influential converts from Anglicanism as a towering figure and intellect in modern Catholicism. Born as an Anglican, ordained into the Church of England, before converting to the Catholic Church and being ordained in Rome, Newman has now not merely been declared a saint, but also been raised to the distinct honour of becoming a Doctor of the Church. In receiving this title, Newman joins just 37 other men and women whom the popes have thus designated as Doctors of the Church, testifying to the eminent and universal impact of his writings and teachings.





In 1829 when John was still a chaplain at Oriel College, his mother and three sisters came to live in Horspath renting a cottage here. Most evenings John would ride to Horspath on his mare, Klepper to stay with his family here and then ride back to Oriel each morning.¹

He campaigned and built the first parish church in Littlemore and founded a school there. In 1843 he formed a community called 'The College' in Littlemore where he lived and ultimately it was here he converted to Roman Catholicism in 1845.

have had the immense privilege to have visited his 'college' in Littlemore on more than one occasion which is looked after by an order of sisters, to look around the library and to actually be in the room where he lived and wrote many of his papers.²

After a year of negotiations, Mr Martin Harris has reported that the Wildlife Conservation Area, recently confirmed in its status as an important Local Wildlife Site, is shown on the Local Habitat Map published by Oxfordshire County Council as part of the Oxfordshire Nature Recovery Strategy (LNRS). Thank you to Mr Martin Harris for his help and for acting on behalf of HPC.

A big thank you to Mr Pettigrove & family for donating the Christmas tree for the Village Green again this year. And thanks to the Bennett family who have kindly offered to put up and decorate the tree.

(A date for your new diary, Christmas trees will be collected in the New Year from the Village Green, next to the bus shelter on Monday 19th January 2026. Please return your trees by Sunday 18th January 2026).

The refurbishment of the village hall project is still on-going and a planning application has been submitted to the District Council. As soon as planning permission is approved the project can move forward. More information to follow.

A second new dog bin has been installed at the bottom of Sandy Lane.

The Council is waiting for quotations for a brick built shelter to be built that matches the existing bus shelter on the Green.

Oxfordshire County Council Highways Department has confirmed that a Highway Inspector will carry out an inspection of the road surface in Manor Drive in December 2025.

As there is going to be a review of the current bus service, the Clerk will contact Oxford Bus Company again to request that an additional stop to Cowley Retail Park is added to the 46 service. Oxford Bus Company have previously stated that they are not able to accommodate this request due to the additional time that it would take to enter and exit the retail park.

The Parish Council is looking for contractors from all trades in the village who would like to register their details with the Council for any maintenance work required in the village, who would be willing to provide a quotation for works as and when required. 



Look out for ... Robin's Pincushion

Getting through the winter can be a challenge for Shotover's wildlife. While some animals hibernate, certain small insects solve the problem by laying their eggs inside a particular plant, such as rose or oak. The presence of their eggs and young influences the plant's cells to grow around them, creating eye-catching galls. These galls provide food and protection for the developing insects, and do not

usually harm the plant.



Where to look: on wild rose plants growing in thickets and hedgerows.

What to look for: a tangle of long, wiry formations, around 2.5cm diameter. They are reddish green in summer, becoming brown and woody in winter. Inside, the young insects feed, then become pupae.

Did you know? In past times, people believed the colourful galls had

medicinal properties. Hanging the galls round a patient's neck was believed to bring relief from ailments such as whooping cough, toothache or rheumatism.

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

WARNING TO Keyless Car Owners in Horspath

How it works & how to stop it!

The most common method is a **relay attack**, which typically involves two thieves working in tandem.

- Signal Capture: One thief stands near your home (often near the front door or windows where keys are typically kept) with a device that can detect and amplify the signal continuously emitted by your key fob.
- Signal Relay: This amplified signal is then transmitted to a second device held by an accomplice standing near the targeted vehicle.
- Vehicle Deception: The car is "tricked" into thinking the actual key fob is nearby.
 This allows the doors to unlock and, in many cases, the engine to be started without a physical key ever being present.

This entire process can take as little as 60 seconds, and because no physical damage is done, it can be hard to prove a theft occurred for insurance purposes.

Prevention Measures

Fortunately, several simple measures can help protect your vehicle from keyless car theft:

- Use a Faraday Pouch: Storing your key fob in a metallic-lined signal-blocking pouch (or even a metal tin/fridge) will prevent its signal from being intercepted by thieves. Make sure to treat spare keys the same way.
- Store Keys Away from Doors/Windows: Keep your key fobs in the center of your home, as far as possible from external walls, doors, and windows, to increase the distance between the key and your car.
- Use Physical Deterrents: Visual deterrents like a steering wheel lock or a wheel clamp can often cause a potential thief to move on to an easier target.
